Course Description

Representative selection of philosophical problems will be explored in areas such as knowledge, reality, religion, science, politics, art and morals.

Learning goals

- Describe and distinguish key concepts at the introductory level in philosophy.
- Read and comprehend philosophical texts, classical or contemporary.
- Present clear and concise explanations and arguments in philosophy.
- Learn how to critically assess philosophical issues.
- Learn how to clearly articulate one's ideas in writing and orally.

Area C2 Learning Outcomes

The learning objectives associated with C2 should focus on the human condition. Specifically, students completing C2 requirements should be able to:

- Demonstrate knowledge of the conventions and methods of the study of the humanities.
- B. Investigate, describe, and analyze the roles and effects of human culture and understanding in the development of human societies.
- C. Compare and analyze various conceptions of humankind.
- D. Demonstrate knowledge and understanding of the historical development of cultures and civilizations, including their animating ideas and values.

Each graded item will be out of 100 points except for the biweekly discussion posts that will be out of 10 points every two weeks and the syllabus/Welcome Letter quiz.

- Two interview exams are required that are about 8 minutes long each. These will be your midterm and final. Students will have to answer philosophical questions posed by the professor in a one-on-one interview. Video must be turned on during the Zoom interview. The move to interview exams is in response to the ease of use of AI on written tests and essay papers. This preserves fairness for students who want to earn their grades and degree.
- Every 2 weeks (there may be exception weeks), students must write a discussion post entry for their Canvas discussion group on a topic of their choosing from the reading assigned for that 2 week period raising your own original objection against an author. This is due by Wednesday 1159PM of the 2nd week of the 2 week cycle and will be out of 6 points. Students must also write a separate response entry that objects to a fellow student's comment in the group. This second entry is due by Friday at 11:59PM of that same week and will be out of an additional 4 points. The second post must provide an original objection specifically against a fellow student's idea. Good reasons must be given to justify one's claim. Posts should carry depth and insight.
- One quiz that will cover the content in the syllabus and welcome letter. This will be an open timed exam in which one may look at the syllabus and letter when taking it.
- Extra credit will be given for Philosophy Symposium attendance. 3% extra credit points will be given on an interview exam for one attendance, with a maximum total of 3% extra credit points given in a semester.
